

BRANTFORD BRANT SAFER OPIOID SUPPLY PROGRAM

The unregulated drug markets remain toxic, unsafe and unhealthy.

Safe supply initiatives provide pharmaceutical equivalents, such as opioids to people who use drugs, overseen by a health care practitioner, with the goal of preventing overdoses and saving lives.



The BBSOS Program provides a safer solution to the toxic street supply for people who use opioids daily. Participants in the program receive prescriptions for pharmaceutical opioids with the goal of supporting them to decrease their reliance on the toxic, unpredictable street supply of opioids.

The main eligibility criteria for the BBSOS program is daily or nearly daily use of illicit opioids.

The program requires participants to meet with their clinical prescriber or a member of the BBSOS care team on a regular basis. This may be daily for some, weekly or biweekly, depending on numerous factors.

BBSOS services are for people at risk of overdose who have not had positive outcomes with other service options in the past (ex. Methadone).

Examples of some services available are:

- ongoing health care and access to primary care services
- support for client goals (ex. focusing on improving health and not requiring that clients stop using illegal drugs)
- access to harm reduction supplies/ gear and education
- peer support
